

# The OCLC Research Survey of Special Collections and Archives

#### The balance sheet

- Collections are growing dramatically
- Use is increasing
- Many materials remain uncataloged
- Backlogs are continuing to grow
- Staffing is being added only in technology
- 75% of library budgets have been cut

#### The three most challenging issues

- 1. Space
- 1. Born-digital materials
- 2. Digitization

#### Survey population


Libraries surveyed: 275

Rate of response: 61% (n=169)

Population: five library organizations in the U.S. and Canada

- Universities: 59%
- Colleges: 19%
- Independent libraries, museums, national institutions, public libraries, others: 22%

#### Lack of metrics

Examples of data that is incomplete or potentially inconsistent due to lack of metrics:

- Collection counts by format
- Type and number of users
- Quantity of materials used
- Catalog records

#### Collections growth


Mean collections growth since 1998 \*

- Books: 50%
- Archives/manuscripts: 50%
- Audio: 240%
- Visual and moving image: 300%

Special collections in remote storage: 67%




#### User services: Onsite visits

#### Percent of each type of user


- Faculty/staff: 9%
- Graduate students: 5%
- Undergraduates: 12%
- Visiting scholars/researchers: 24%
- Local community: 7%
- "Other": 43% (i.e., type of user not specified)

### Reasons to disallow use of unprocessed materials

- Difficulty in using materials received in serious disorder
- Potential for endangering fragile materials not yet properly protected
- Must identify materials that should be restricted for reasons of privacy or confidentiality.


#### Use of digital cameras




#### Interlibrary loan



#### **Catalog records**

Format	n	Online	Offline	No Records	Described within Archival Collections
Printed volumes	154	85%	7%	8%	n/a
Archival collections	153	56%	14%	30%	n/a
Manuscripts (items)	96	51%	23%	26%	n/a
Cartographic materials	129	42%	16%	23%	24%
Visual materials	136	21%	13%	35%	35%
Audiovisual materials	128	25%	7%	36%	36%
Born-digital materials	89	29%	1%	34%	40%

#### Archival management

#### Archival finding aids

- Online: 44%
- Print-only or in local silos: 30%


#### Simplified processing techniques

- Always: 18%
- Sometimes: 57%

#### Finding aids tools are not standardized

- Most commonly used: word processing, databases
- Archivists Toolkit: 34%
- Archon: 11%

#### **Digitization**


Projects completed and/or active program: 97%

#### Special collections contributions

- Collections content: 99%
- Project management: 87%
- Cataloging/metadata: 84%
- Digital image production: 71%

Large-scale project completed: 38% (??)

#### Large-scale digitization of special collections



Definition: Systematic reproduction of entire collections using streamlined production methods that account for special needs.

#### Licensing digitized special collections

Content licensed to commercial firms for digitization: 26%

#### Born-digital archival materials


#### Simply stated ...

- Undercollected
- Undercounted
- Undermanaged
- Unpreserved
- Inaccessible


#### Born-digital archival materials

- Holdings reported by: 35%
  - Percent held by top two libraries: 51%
  - Percent held by top 13 libraries: 93%
- Digital materials currently held by: 79%
- Assignment of responsibility for born-digital management made by: 55%
- Education/training needed by: 83%
- We surmise that collecting is generally passive, sporadic, limited.

#### Born-digital materials already held




#### Impediments to born-digital management

## Special collections contributions to institutional repositories



#### Top education and training needs

- 1. Born-digital materials: 83%
- 1. Information technology: 65%
- 2. Intellectual property: 56%
- 3. Cataloging and metadata: 51%

#### **Action items**

- Establish metrics for standardized measurement of key measures.
- 2. Identify barriers to and goals of collaborative collection development.
- 3. Take collective action to preserve at-risk audiovisual materials.
- 4. Liberally implement access and interlibrary loan approvals.
- 5. Adopt sustainable methodologies to stop the growth of backlogs.
- 6. Develop shared metadata capacities for maps and printed graphics.
- 7. Convert legacy finding aids without revising or upgrading.
- 8. Develop models for *large-scale digitization* of special collections.
- 9. Identify the scope of and gaps in the corpus of digitized rare books.
- 10. Identify the relationship between born-digital materials and special collections.
- 11. Determine basic steps for jump-starting management of born-digital materials.
- 12. Develop use cases and cost studies for born-digital materials.
- 13. Confirm high-priority areas for education and training and fill the gaps.
